

## Quieta nox: mysterium (Silent night: a mystery)

## Program Notes

Aleatoric/Chance Music is not a new concept. John Cage states, "I can't understand why people are frightened of new ideas. I'm frightened of the old ones." "Quieta nox: Mysterium" captures the essence of the "Silent Night" text with the use of chord clusters and dissonance.

When singing this version of "Silent Night," the choristers sing verse one in the traditional manner. I recommend the choir uses American Sign Language (ASL) for a more dramatic effect. You can find a few ASL motions required on many internet sources.

When the choir sings verse one the second time, the singers are given the musical freedom to "create" by improvising the tempo and rhythms on their individual vocal part. Choristers sing their respective parts with individual rhythms and the speed of the sign language is adjusted to the tempo they choose. Most singers perform the aleatoric verse at a slow speed with sustained pitch from their respective parts.

The bass section starts out first, followed by the soprano, tenor, and alto sections approximately 5-10 seconds after the previous part begins. Each part enters together then about 1/3 of the section begins improvising the rhythm and tempi on beat 2. Apott er 1/3 begins improvising the rhythm and tempi on beat 3. The remaining 1/2 begins improvising the rhythm and tempi on beat 1 of the following measure. This enables the aleatory to build gradually. When each part reaches the end of the piece, singers hold their last pitch until everyone concludes on a major chord.

For singers who are insecure about improvising 'entry', I suggest creating a series of 6-10 graphs that can be distributed to each section of the provided below. It is important that every singer has a different rhythm and speed from the rest of the rest ction. A sample graph is provided below. The length of the line represents the duration of the interespective parts.

Note, I have omitted "round you virgin mother and child, holy infant so tender and mild" during the aleatoric verse. Choristers should not look at the conductor and may face in various directions to aid in the dramatic effect of the presentation while signing the text. Furthermore, the eyes of the singers should follow the motion of their hands. The conductor will simply bring in each part during the aleatoric verse and signal the *morendo* and release at the end of the arrangement. *Daniel Jackson* 

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
