Note: In general, Korean [t] and [k] sound should be much harder and less explosive just as in *Così fan tutte* in Italian.

*[ts] = somewhere between [dʒ] in general and [ts] in *pizza*

[tʃi] = chi- in **chihuahua

Mung beans are an important source of sprouts for eating and cooking. They are high in nutrients and provide protein and fiber to one's diet. In Korean, "Sae" by itself means "bird." When "ya" is added to "sae," it indicates that someone is calling the bird and possibly expressing a feeling of affection or fondness. If the bird sits on the mung bean paddies and makes the flowers fall, the merchant who harvests the beans for sale will be sad because there will be fewer beans.



Minhee Kim is a music teacher and pianist from South Korea. A graduate of the University of Hawai'i at Manoa with a Post-Baccalaureate certificate in Music Education and a Master of Music degree in piano performance, Minhee has taught early childhood music and choir classes in South Korea, Hawai'i, and Malaysia.
